FY19 Budget

		sessions for those that are interested. The Nurtured Heart Approach has been shown to
		create transformative changes in children diagnosed with ADHD, Oppositional Defiant
(Training		Disorder, Reactive Attachment Disorder and other behavioral, emotional and anxiety

		children helps build the child's inner wealth and use that intensity in successful ways.
